2. Which country had the least soldiers in World War One?
3. Which country had the highest number of deaths?
4. Which country had the least number of deaths?
5. Draw a graph in your books to show the numbers of soldiers of each country and the numbers of deaths.

Questions

1. How did women contribute to the war effort?
2. How were civilians affected by the war?
3. How effective was government propaganda during the war?
4. To what extent were people's lives affected by the war.
5. To what extent were women's lives changed by the war.

Tweeting the Treaty

Today, you can watch live events unfold as they are happening on social media. For example, onlookers, participants and political leaders reported on the 2011 uprising in Egypt with "as-it-happened" updates. What if the same technology had been available in 1919?

In this assignment, you will create a series of 280-character-or-fewer tweets (messages) that will unveil the Peace Conference in Paris "as it happened." You must use your own imagination and creativity in deciding whom your tweeters will be while successfully conveying the competing interests and opinions of the participants in the conference. Write your tweets from the viewpoint of the world leaders in attendance to tell the story of the conference.

Expectations

- You will create a fictitious Twitter feed with between 15 and 20 tweets. Apart from the historical anachronism of a social media feed existing at the end of WWI, you must strive for historical accuracy in this assignment.
- You will try your best to follow the conventions of Twitter for this assignment. You will use no more than 280 characters per Tweet.
- You do not have to provide your citations for this assignment, but you are not permitted to use actual quotes from any participants in the Peace Conference as tweets. Each leader (Wilson, Lloyd George, Lenin, Chancellor of Germany and Clemenceau) must post at least two tweets and respond to a minimum of one tweet posted by another leader
